

ADMISSION PROCEDURES

First-time college students are strongly encouraged to apply to Purdue early in their senior year (August to October). Important dates and deadlines are listed below, but those who wait until close to November 15 to apply will not receive an admission decision until early February.

APPLY ONLINE

Using Purdue's online application is the fastest way to apply, and students who apply this way are able to check the status of their application online. Students without Internet access may use this paper application. However, students who use the paper application will experience processing delays and will not have online access to status information.

COMPLETING THE APPLICATION

A student's application must be complete in order to meet any deadline; an application is not considered complete until the Office of Admissions has received all required items. Material submitted electronically must arrive by the deadline; paper submissions must be postmarked by the deadline. For most high school students, required items include the following:

- > application form;
- > \$50 application fee (or qualified fee waiver);
- > official high school transcript;
- > SAT or ACT (including writing) test score. Test scores MUST be sent from the testing agency.

Purdue also requests a counselor form from the student's high school counselor, which

is included with this paper application. Additional copies may be found at www.admissions.purdue.edu under the "Applying" menu.

ADMISSION CRITERIA

Applications are reviewed individually and holistically. First and foremost, applicants must be prepared academically for college overall and specifically for the Purdue college, school, or program to which they are seeking admission. Purdue considers the following factors: high school course expectations (see next page); overall grades in academic coursework; grades related to intended major; strength of overall high school curriculum; trends in achievement; class rank; overall grade point average; core grade point average (English, academic math, laboratory science, social science, foreign

Important Dates and Deadlines

AUGUST 1, 2009

- > 2010 undergraduate application available online. Students are strongly encouraged to apply early in their senior year (August to October).

NOVEMBER 15, 2009

- > Firm admission application deadline for Purdue's Trustees and Presidential scholarships and priority deadline for all other Purdue scholarships. To meet this deadline, a student's admission application must be complete by this date. (See "Completing the Application" section above.) Be advised, students who wait until close to November 15 to apply will not receive an admission decision until early February.
- > **Priority* application deadline for undergraduate majors in the following schools:**
 - School of Health Sciences
 - School of Nursing
 - School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences
- > **Firm* application deadline for the following majors:**

DECEMBER 11, 2009

- > Purdue will begin releasing admission decisions after 5:00 p.m. Eastern Time. During peak periods, processing and evaluating applications can require 8-12 weeks. Decisions are not guaranteed by December 11 and students who do not apply early enough in their senior year will not have a decision by December 11.

JANUARY 1, 2010

- > Students who completed their admission application by the November 15 scholarship deadline can submit new, better test scores by this date for scholarship consideration. Scores must be submitted electronically by the testing agency and arrive by January 1.

FEBRUARY 15, 2010

- > A small percentage of Purdue scholarships require a scholarship application. To be considered for these, admitted students must submit the scholarship application by February 15 and file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by March 1.

MARCH 1, 2010

- > Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) priority deadline.
- > Purdue's preferential admission application deadline. For most academic programs, applications will be accepted until this date. However, at this time of year remaining space is limited and admission is highly competitive. Therefore, students are strongly encouraged to apply early in their senior year (August to October).

MAY 1, 2010

- > Deadline to accept offer of admission for fall semester by submitting a \$200 nonrefundable deposit.
- > Priority deadline to apply for on-campus housing.

* *Priority deadline means that applications still may be accepted after the deadline if space remains available. Firm deadline means that applications will not be accepted after the deadline.*

language); SAT or ACT scores (including writing); personal statement on application; ability to be successful in intended major; personal background and experiences; information provided by high school guidance counselor (or other school administrator); time of year the student applies; and space availability in the intended program. All applicants must graduate from high school or have a GED, and Indiana residents are given preference.

ACT AND SAT

Purdue accepts either the ACT or SAT and requires that scores be sent directly from the testing agency. A writing score from one of these tests is required. When making an admission decision, Purdue will use the best available score. When sending test scores, use the following school codes for Purdue West Lafayette: ACT – 1230; SAT – 1631.

ADMISSION NOTIFICATION

For fall 2010 enrollment, Purdue will begin releasing admission decisions after 5:00 p.m. Eastern Time on December 11, 2009. Although decisions are not guaranteed by December 11, students who apply early in their senior year (August to October) are more likely to have a decision on or near this date. Students who apply online will have the ability to check the status of their application online.

ACCEPTING THE ADMISSION OFFER

May 1 is the deadline for students to accept their offer of admission for the fall semester. To accept, students must pay a nonrefundable \$200 advance deposit.

INDIANA RESIDENTS

Honors Diploma

Purdue strongly encourages Indiana high school students to pursue the Academic Honors Diploma. Although earning the diploma does not guarantee admission to Purdue, students who do earn it generally are stronger candidates.

Minimum High School Course Expectations for 2010 Enrollment*

- › **MATH**** — six semesters
Algebra, geometry, advanced algebra, trigonometry, calculus, and statistics. Not computer, general, or business math.
 - › **LABORATORY SCIENCE** — six semesters
Biology, chemistry, physics, earth/space science, physiology/anatomy, etc.
 - › **ENGLISH** — eight semesters
Grammar, composition, literature, speech, and vocabulary. Not journalism, newspaper, yearbook, or theatre arts.
 - › **SOCIAL STUDIES** — six semesters
U.S. history, world history, geography, government, economics, psychology, etc.
 - › **FOREIGN LANGUAGE** — four semesters
Any foreign language taught as part of a high school curriculum, including American Sign Language.

Twenty-first Century Scholars — Purdue Promise

For income-eligible Twenty-first Century Scholars, Purdue offers the Purdue Promise program, which combines financial aid with structured academic and co-curricular activities designed to enhance success at Purdue. For eligible students, Purdue will provide a financial aid package that will include gift aid and work-study to meet the students' full need. Purdue Opportunities System-wide

Because of the competitive nature of Purdue's academic programs, not all applicants can be admitted to the West Lafayette campus. However, the University is able to offer opportunities within the Purdue system to many Indiana residents who are unable to be admitted to the West Lafayette campus as beginning college students. Students who are denied admission to Purdue West Lafayette and qualify for admission to a Purdue regional campus or College of Technology location elsewhere in the state learn of these opportunities within their admission decision letters. Many students who take advantage of these offers eventually transfer to Purdue's West Lafayette campus.

FINANCIAL AID

Online Financial Aid Estimator

The Purdue Financial Aid Estimator is an easy online tool that helps families plan for educational costs at the University. The estimator uses information such as student academic achievement, as well as family income and assets, to calculate financial need and estimate merit- and need-based awards the student could receive at Purdue. The estimator is available at www.purdue.edu/dfa/estimator.

Applying for Financial Aid

To receive most types of financial aid, students must file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) between January 1 and March 1 of their enrollment year. The FAFSA determines eligibility for institutional (Purdue), federal, and state aid.

The income and asset information on the FAFSA will determine the Expected Family

Contribution (EFC) — a standardized, federal calculation of a student and family’s ability to contribute toward the student’s cost of education.

The FAFSA for 2010 enrollment will be available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov on January 1, 2010. Students should release FAFSA information to Purdue West Lafayette using Federal School Code 001825.

Financial Aid Award Notification

Admitted students who complete the FAFSA by March 1 and respond to any follow-up requests for information should receive their Purdue award notification in early April. The notification is available online through the myPurdue portal, to which students gain access after being admitted.

Contacting Purdue

POLICY STATEMENTS

GED — The Purdue University Division of Financial Aid administers federal, state, and University financial assistance programs. These programs require students to have a high school diploma, GED, or pass a test approved by the U.S. Department of Education. Information regarding the GED or the approved tests is available through any public high school or any state department of education/public instruction.

Graduation Rates — Graduation rates for the West Lafayette campus are available in the Office of Enrollment Management, Schleman Hall, 475 Stadium Mall Drive, West Lafayette, IN 47907-2050, (765) 494-0292, enrollmentmanagement@purdue.edu. These rates are calculated and made available as required by the Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act.

Alcohol Policy — Purdue students are subject to Indiana law, which prohibits consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages by anyone under 21 years of age. The University does not permit alcohol to be brought onto Purdue property, with certain exceptions, by any person regardless of age. Fraternity and sorority houses and student cooperative housing units are considered off-campus housing and are permitted to have alcoholic beverages, but they must observe specific University guidelines and state law.

The University does not have the responsibility or the authority to control off-campus student drinking, but it does attempt to give students the opportunity to make informed and mature decisions about alcohol use. A variety of educational and counseling programs are offered to help students deal with all aspects of alcohol and drug use, from peer pressure to dependency.

Housing — University housing, facilities, and programs are available to all students based on Purdue’s policy of equal opportunity regardless of national origin, race, or religion. It is the University’s desire and expectation that all others providing housing or services to Purdue students will do so in a manner consistent with this policy. However, the University does not approve or disapprove specific housing accommodations since it believes that the choice of housing rests with you, the student.

Immunization — Indiana state law requires proof of immunization for the following vaccine-preventable diseases as condition of enrollment on residential campuses of state universities: rubeola (10-day measles), mumps, rubella (German measles), diphtheria,

and tetanus. In addition, international students must provide documentation that they have been tested for tuberculosis after arriving in the United States. Information regarding compliance will be forwarded to all admitted students.

Nondiscrimination Policy Statement

Residence — Purdue reserves the right to request documentary evidence in support of a residence claim.

Safety — The University strives to provide a safe and secure environment for students, staff, and visitors. Social Security Number — The Social Security Number (SSN) is requested as the most effective way to uniquely identify you to accurately process your application and match it with other records such as SAT or ACT scores, transcripts, and financial aid. Its use is restricted to secure University business processes, such as those necessary for federal and state reporting as well as institutional purposes. Applicants are not required to provide their SSN.

Students with Disabilities — Purdue University is committed to providing equal access and equal opportunity to University courses, activities, and programs for students with disabilities. Students with documented disabilities that substantially limit a major life activity, such as learning, walking, or seeing, may qualify for academic adjustments and/or services. PUID — Upon admission to Purdue University, you will be assigned a 10-digit Purdue identification number (PUID). This number will be your official University identifier and will appear on your Purdue identification card. Your PUID will be required for your secure access to many University services and personal records and should not be shared with anyone.

You must select a college/school and area of study on your application, which will be evaluated based on admission requirements and space availability in that area of study.

Preprofessional Students

Students who are preparing for a professional program should choose a major based on their academic interests and abilities. Strong grades, demanding courses, and a well-rounded curriculum are more important than a student's major. In fact, professional programs such as medical schools, dental schools, and law schools accept all undergraduate majors.

Students should consult with their Purdue academic advisor regarding professional goals. Students interested in medical school or other health professions also may contact the Health Professions Advising Office, (765) 494-4747, if they have questions about health careers, prerequisite courses, and other activities that will utilize their abilities and enhance their opportunities for acceptance into healthcare programs. Students interested in other professional programs may contact the Purdue college/school to which they are seeking undergraduate admission.
